COMPLETING THE UCAS APPLICATION













Student registers for a UCAS Hub account to carry out research and start an application.

Student completes all sections of the application and sends it to their school/college.


Teacher or adviser reviews the application and adds reference and predicted grades.

Applications are sent to UCAS by the school of college on behalf of the student.

Universities and colleges make their decisions on the application.

Linking to a school

- If you're applying with the help of a school, college or centre you should enter their 'buzzword' to link your application to them.
- The buzzword is a unique code set by your school, college or centre-Largs2026
- By linking your application you're giving your school, college or centre permission to view and track your application. It also means they'll provide you with a reference, and send your application to UCAS on your behalf.

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
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School Deadlines

- End of September- all sections of the UCAS application form (except personal Statement) should be complete.
- All pupils to attend personal statement workshops with Paul & Pamelaour Career Advisers.
- Before October holidays- 1st draft of personal statement should be given to referee as well as info to support Reference. (word document). This does not include early applicant deadlines. Mr Sinclair will check in with those pupils.
- Post October holidays- regular check ins with S6 Year Team to check over drafts of personal statement until its complete.
- End of November UCAS form should be complete (Paid/Sent).
- Pre Christmas Holidays reference added and S6 Year Team will check over forms before sending off to UCAS.
- This process allows pupils to then focus on prelims after the Christmas holidays.

TRACKING YOUR APPLICATION

Follow your application to:

- check progress
- see your choices
- update contact information
- view and reply to your offers

One of three decisions:

- unconditional offer
- conditional offer
- unsuccessful



Submitted to your school or college

Your application has been sent to your school or college and is being checked by your adviser. Once they have approved it your application will be sent to UCAS.



Your application has been returned by your adviser

Your adviser has returned your application, go to your application to see what amendments they are recommending for you.



Waiting for decisions

Universities or colleges are considering your application.

Providers have until dd-mm-yyyy to respond to your choices.



All decisions received

You've received a decision from all of your choices. You can now reply to your offers at any time. **Reply by dd-mm-yyyy**

Replies to offers

Once you have decisions on all your choices, you can hold a maximum of two offers:

- one as a 'firm' acceptance your first choice
- the other as an 'insurance' acceptance. This acts as a back-up if you do not get into your 'firm' choice

You must then decline any remaining offers.

Once all your decisions and replies have been made, if you are not holding an offer, you may be able to use Extra or Clearing to find available places.



Other options



Extra (26th Feb – 4th Jul)

- Used all five choices and had no offers.
- Add Extra choices for consideration one at a time in Track.

Clearing (5th Jul – Oct)

- Apply after 30 June, receive no offers, decline all offers, not met conditions.
- Find vacancies from early July, and add a Clearing choice to your application.

Examples for Extenuating Circumstances

- Outside of school, David takes on significant responsibilities within his family by supporting his mum in caring for his three young siblings. It's to his credit that he does this, but early in his studies it did create pressure when he had competing deadlines for internally assessed work. He has been very open with us about balancing his home life and studies and we have been delighted to support him with flexibility on deadlines.
- Jordan was diagnosed with macular dystrophy known as Best Disease, an eye disorder that can cause worsening (progressive) vision loss for which there is no treatment and is registered as visually impaired. It has been a life-changing diagnosis. We ensured Jordan sat at the front of the class, all lectures printed off in A3 handouts or given as PowerPoint (to his personal ipad) as he is unable to read the board. The school have contacted the examination board on his behalf.

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Examples for other supportive information

- The very top of a large cohort, Harry is an outstanding Biologist. His intellectual curiosity is evidenced through his wider reading and passion for the subject, which underpins his vast subject knowledge. Grasping new concepts quickly, he makes links to previous learning and is able to express his ideas with clarity and detail, making accurate use of chemical terminology. He has recently taken part in the Cambridge Chemistry Challenge, receiving a Copper Award, and is currently enrolled online in an edX introductory course on Biochemistry
- Olivia is a gifted and talented national and GB level U18 national squad hockey player. During her studies she has spent significant time away from the classroom to engage with rigorous training. This has the potential to put pressure on her academic work, however, Olivia has never failed to make up for lost learning time. Olivia's attitude, commitment, and drive to succeed is nurtured through her sport is also apparent in her studies. We hope that her future university will be supportive in enabling her to continue to balance her academic and sporting commitments; if they do, they will find the skills she brings back to the learning environment highly rewarding.
